 Paul's Instruction Concerning Doctrine (1 Timothy 1) A. The <u>GOAL</u> of sound doctrine is:

- 1. LOVE from a pure heart.
- 2. So one might keep a clean <u>CONSCIENCE</u>.
- 3. So believers will increase in a sincere <u>FAITH</u>.
- B. Paul <u>DEFENDED</u> sound doctrine.
 - 1. Avoid <u>LEGALISM</u>.
 - 2. Avoid <u>GNOSTICISM</u>.

- C. Paul testified to God's <u>GRACE</u>.
- D. Paul instructed Timothy to "<u>FIGHT THE GOOD</u> <u>FIGHT</u>" (1 Timothy 1:18).

II. Paul's Instruction Concerning Public Worship (1 Timothy 2)

- A. <u>PRAYER</u> is the most essential part of public worship.
- **B.** Prayer includes:
 - 1. ENTREATIES (desires, needs).
 - 2. <u>PRAYERS</u> (bold access to God).
 - 3. <u>PETITIONS</u> (requests, intercessions).
 - 4. <u>THANKSGIVING</u> (giving thanks).

C. Paul gave instruction for women in the church.

1. They must <u>DRESS</u> properly.

III. Paul's Instruction Concerning Church Leaders (1 Timothy 3)

- A. Paul listed the character traits of an <u>ELDER</u> (bishop).
 - 1. His job is to oversee the <u>SPIRITUAL</u> life of the church.
 - 2. He must be above <u>REPROACH</u>.
 - 3. He must be tolerant, prudent, respectful, hospitable and able to <u>TEACH</u>.
 - 4. He must have a good <u>REPUTATION</u> outside of the church.

- B. Paul listed the character traits of a <u>DEACON</u>.
 1. The traits of a deacon are similar to that of an <u>ELDER</u>.
 - 2. The deacon's job is to <u>SERVE</u>.

IV. Paul's Instruction Concerning False Teachers (1 Timothy 4)

- A. Paul IDENTIFIED the false teachers.
- B. He instructed Timothy to <u>STAND</u> firm against false teachers:
 - 1. KNOW the Word of God.
 - 2. <u>DISCIPLINE</u> yourself for godliness.
 - 3. <u>FIX</u> your hope on the living God.
 - 4. Read, teach, and <u>EXHORT</u> through the Word of God.

- 5. <u>USE</u> your spiritual gifts.
- 6. <u>PERSERVE</u> in these things.

 V. Paul's Instruction Concerning Pastors' Relationships With Church Members (1 Timothy 5:1-6:5)

- A. Treat all with <u>RESPECT</u> and honor them as family.
- B. <u>WIDOWS</u> have a special place in the church.
- C. <u>HONOR</u> godly elders and discipline those who continue in sin.
- D. False teachers should be <u>IDENTIFIED</u>.

2 Timothy: The Book of Instructions on Endurance

I. Paul Gave Timothy The Characteristics of "The Man of God" (2 Timothy 1-2)

- A. Paul greeted Timothy as his beloved <u>SON</u> in the faith.
- B. Paul <u>ENCOURAGED</u> Timothy with loving words.
- C. Timothy was reminded of his <u>CALL</u> and God's enabling power.
- D. The qualifications of a <u>SOLDIER</u> of Christ were described.
- E. Timothy was told how to be a <u>WORKER</u> pleasing to Christ.

II. Paul Gave Timothy Cautions For "The Man of God" (2 Timothy 3)

- A. Know the <u>SIGNS</u> of the last days.
- B. **ENDURE** suffering as Paul had done because:
 - 1. The Lord was faithful to <u>DELIVER</u> him.
 - 2. All who desire to live for Christ will be <u>PERSECUTED</u>.
 - <u>EVIL</u> men will go from bad to worse deceiving and being deceived.

- C. Timothy must <u>CONTINUE</u> in what he had learned and remember from whom and where he learned it.
- D. All Scripture is "God breathed," or INSPIRED.
- E. Scripture is valuable because:
 - 1. It teaches by explaining what's <u>RIGHT</u>.
 - 2. It reproves by explaining what's WRONG.
 - 3. It corrects by explaining how to GET RIGHT.

It instructs by explaining how to <u>STAY</u> <u>RIGHT</u>.

5. It completes and <u>EQUIPS</u> "the Man of God" for kingdom work.

III. Paul Challenged Timothy With A Charge for "The Man of God" (2 Timothy 4)

- A. Timothy was charged to:
 - 1. <u>PREACH</u> the good news.
 - 2. Be <u>READY</u> at all times to inspire people.
 - 3. <u>REPROVE</u> those who are doing wrong.
 - 4. <u>REBUKE</u> sinners with stern reprimands.
 - 5. <u>ENCOURAGE</u> with great patience and careful teaching.

- B. A time would come when people would no longer listen to <u>TRUTH</u> but would desire teachers who would say what they wanted to hear.
- C. Paul's last letter to Timothy ends with very <u>PERSONAL</u> words.

Titus: The Book of Instructions on Church Order

I. The Protection of Sound Doctrine in the Church (Titus 1)

- A. Paul instructed Titus to ordain qualified <u>LEADERS</u> in the church.
 - 1. <u>OVERSEERS</u> bishops; had special responsibilities to superintend; pastors
 - <u>ELDERS</u> senators; older ones appointed by apostles; had spiritual giftedness
 - 3. <u>DEACONS</u> servants of someone; helpers; practical agents

- B. Paul ordered Titus to choose leaders whose overall <u>CHARACTER</u> was blameless.
 - 1. <u>DOMESTICALLY</u> with their wives and children at home
 - 2. <u>PERSONALLY</u> respected in the community and at work
 - 3. DOCTRINALLY know and show the Word
- C. Paul encouraged Titus to rebuke the <u>FALSE</u> teachers in the church.

Titus: The Book of Instructions on Church Order

II. The Practice of Sound Doctrine in the Church (Titus 2)

- A. Paul directed Titus to teach the older men and women to <u>MENTOR</u> the younger men and women.
 - <u>TRAIN</u> to advise; to instruct; suggests a close relationship between elder and younger
 - <u>ENCOURAGE</u> to give hope; to urge on; to help develop; to exhort

- 3. <u>EXAMPLE</u> to give a visible impression; to illustrate; to show quality or characteristics
- 4. <u>TEACH</u> to give verbal instruction; to impart knowledge or information
- <u>REBUKE</u> to reprove sharply; to correct; to bring to light; to expose wrong

- B. Paul insisted that Titus train the younger men and women to be <u>SELF-CONTROLLED</u>.
- C. Paul told Titus to teach slaves to be <u>OBEDIENT</u> and trustworthy.

Titus: The Book of Instructions on Church Order III. The Participation in Sound Doctrine in the World (Titus 3)

- A. Paul required all members to <u>OBEY</u> the law of the land.
- B. Paul reminded the believers why they should do profitable, <u>GOOD</u> works.
- C. Paul demanded that the congregation avoid <u>UNPROFITABLE</u> and useless works.

Seven Reasons to Believe the Bible

- <u>UNITY</u>: The sixty-six books were written by forty authors over 1,500 years, but they tell one unified story.
- 2. <u>CLAIMS</u>: The Bible claims to be God's Word written by men moved by the Spirit.
- 3. <u>HISTORY</u>: Tests of archaeology and bibliography have never refuted it.
- 4. <u>PROPHECY</u>: Prophecy of the Bible has been fulfilled.

- 5. <u>SURVIVAL</u>: Man's many attempts to destroy it have failed (see Mark 13:31).
- 6. <u>INFLUENCE</u>: The Bible's influence on society has been more positive than any other book.
- 7. <u>TRANSFORMATION</u>: Individual lives have been transformed by it.

I. Philemon's Character Praised (Philemon 1-7)

- A. Philemon was Paul's beloved <u>BROTHER</u> and fellow worker.
- B. Philemon's <u>CHURCH met in his house</u>.
- C. Philemon had great faith toward God and <u>LOVE</u> toward the saints.

II. Philemon's Character Tested (Philemon 8-20)

- A. Paul appealed to Philemon on behalf of Philemon's <u>SLAVE</u>, Onesimus.
- B. Onesimus became <u>USELESS</u>. He stole from Philemon and ran away.
- C. In Christ, Onesimus became <u>USEFUL</u>. He ministered to Paul.

D. Paul appealed to Philemon to <u>ACCEPT</u>
Onesimus as a brother in the Lord.
E. Paul offered to <u>REPAY</u> Onesimus's debt.

Philemon: The Book of Instructions on Forgiveness III. Philemon's Character Trusted (Philemon 21-

25)

- A. Paul was confident Philemon would be <u>OBEDIENT</u> and do more than asked.
- B. Paul was confident Philemon's <u>PRAYER</u> would free him from prison.

IV. Lessons We Learn From Philemon

- A. We need to be <u>FORGIVEN</u>.
- B. It is not enough to be forgiven; we must also <u>FORGIVE</u>.
- C. Once forgiven, we must make <u>RESTITUTION</u>.
